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

UNDERSTANDING

PA PROGRAM APPLICATIONS

With so many different parts to keep track of, the application process for PA programs can often feel overwhelming; but it doesn't have to be. With an understanding of the key components and prerequisites that make up a your application, you'll be better prepared to navigate the process with confidence. **Here's what you need to know.**

The Anatomy of a PA Program Application

Transcripts

PA programs require official records from all post-secondary institutions you've attended. Admissions committees use applicants' transcripts to determine readiness for the rigors of their curriculum, so it's in your best interest to build a transcript that reflects strong academic performance — especially in science courses.

Personal Statement


The personal statement is your opportunity to tell your story. It should articulate why you want to become a PA, draw from your personal experiences, and demonstrate your

commitment to the profession. Aim to build a compelling narrative that sets you apart from other applicants.

Letters of Recommendation

Recommendations provide insight into your character, skills, and potential as a PA student. Most programs require two or three letters, often from healthcare professionals you've worked with, professors, or supervisors who can speak to your qualifications and dedication.





Entrance Exam Scores (If Required)

For PA programs, submitting entrance exam results isn't always a requirement for admission consideration. For institutions that do require prospective students to include test scores with their applications, the GRE is the most commonly required exam. If applicable, plan to prepare for and schedule your test well in advance of the application deadline.

Description of Relevant Activities

PA programs prioritize applicants who have hands-on experience. You'll need to document your clinical hours, relevant volunteer work, shadowing experience, and any other activities you've taken part in that demonstrate your passion for PA work.

Common Prerequisites

Required Coursework

While exact requirements will differ between programs, all PA programs expect entering students will have completed certain prerequisite coursework. These typically include biology, chemistry, anatomy and physiology, microbiology, genetics, math, physics, psychology, and a writing intensive course such as English. To ensure your academic record aligns, we recommend reviewing each program's course requirements well in advance.



Clinical Hours

Accumulating direct patient care hours is an essential part of your application for PA programs. In general, schools often require between 500 and 2,000 hours, but similar to coursework prerequisites, minimums will vary between institutions. These hours can be earned by working in various entry-level healthcare roles, such as medical assistant or patient care technician.

GPA Requirements

For most PA programs, the baseline GPA requirement for acceptance is a 3.0, but some schools may set this threshold slightly higher or lower. However, competitive applicants will exceed these minimums, so it's important to strive for the highest overall GPA possible. In addition to your overall GPA, admissions committees also consider specific GPAs for a more complete picture of your proficiency in relevant coursework. Your science GPA, non-science GPA, and BCP (biology, chemistry, physics) GPA will also factor into admissions decisions.

APPLICATION TIMELINE OVERVIEW

Putting together a strong application requires thoughtful planning, dedication, and organization.

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1 YEAR PRIOR TO APPLICATION DATE:

CHECKING THE BOXES

As your application deadlines approach, prioritize completing any remaining prerequisites and meeting the minimum number of clinical hours required by your target programs.

You should also spend this year strengthening your relationships with potential references & preparing for any entrance exams you need to take.

Building the foundation of a successful PA program application begins long before you apply. Once you know you want to become a PA, start researching potential programs and their requirements, focus on excelling in the classroom, gaining relevant clinical experience, and exploring healthcare-related extracurriculars.



6 MONTHS PRIOR TO APPLICATION DATE:

ASSEMBLING YOUR APPLICATION

In the months leading up to your application submission, focus on assembling the individual components. This includes requesting letters of recommendation, drafting and refining your personal statement, and continuing to log clinical hours and participating in extracurricular activities.

By beginning to put your final applications together now, you'll save yourself unwanted stress down the road.

1 MONTH PRIOR TO

APPLICATION DEADLINE

With final deadlines fast approaching, it's time to tie up any loose ends. Submit your completed application through the appropriate platforms and ensure all supporting documents, such as transcripts and recommendation letters, have been sent.

To present a polished application, be sure to double-check all materials for accuracy and completeness before submitting.

Early preparation and following a structured timeline.

WHAT TO EXPECT

AFTER APPLICATION SUBMISSION

Your application journey doesn't end once all your materials are submitted.

There's still more to come:

Waiting periods:

Be patient, as schools need time to review all the applications they receive and exact timelines vary widely.

Supplemental applications:

Some programs require additional essays or forms in addition to what the <u>Centralized Application Service for Physician Assistants</u> (<u>CASPA</u>) — the online application service that most PA programs use — requires. Respond to these requests promptly.

Interview requests:

If invited for an interview, prepare by researching common questions and practicing responses.

Admissions decisions:

Offers are typically communicated via email or application portals. Be ready to make enrollment decisions quickly.





YOUR PA SCHOOL CHECKLIST

Use the following checklist to make sure you submit an application that's strong and on time.

6 MONTHS PRIOR TO APPLICATION DATE

	Request	Recommend	lations
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Reach out to your chosen references early. If any of your first choices decline your request, get in touch with your backup references promptly.

☐ Finish required coursework

Wrap up any remaining prerequisite courses and ensure you've maintained a strong GPA.

☐ Begin your personal statement

Start drafting your essay. Use this time to refine your story and get feedback from mentors or peers.

☐ Continue accruing clinical hours & participating in extracurriculars

Maintain your momentum for both activities.

1 MONTH PRIOR TO APPLICATION DEADLINE

Order transcripts

Request official transcripts from all post-secondary institutions you've attended — the earlier the better.

☐ Submit your application

Complete and submit your application, either through CASPA or directly to your chosen programs — whichever method each school prefers. Aim to submit early to avoid the risk of missing deadlines due to technical issues and to take advantage of rolling admissions.

8 TIPS FOR A

STAND-OUT APPLICATION

Crafting a strong application for PA programs requires more than just meeting the minimum requirements.

To stand out in all the right ways, we highly recommend:

O1 Going above and beyond when accruing clinical hours:

While most programs have minimum clinical hour requirements, competitive applicants often far exceed these thresholds.

02 Apply early:

If your target schools offer rolling admissions, submitting your application early can improve your chances of acceptance, as more spots will be available.

03 Know why you want to become a PA:

Schools want to see passion and purpose in your application, so reflect on your experiences and communicate your motivations with sincerity.





04 Focus on your GPA:

A strong GPA, particularly in science courses, demonstrates your ability to handle the academic rigor of PA programs. If your GPA is lower than you'd like, consider retaking key courses.

05 Leverage your network when choosing references:

For glowing recommendations, select individuals who know you well and can speak to your abilities and character.

06 Write a compelling personal statement:

Your personal statement gives you an opportunity to tell your story. A well-crafted narrative that reflects your unique experiences can make a lasting impression on admissions committees.

07 Make sure you're prepared for interviews:

If you're invited to interview, preparation is key. Research common questions, practice your responses, and be ready to talk about why you're a strong fit for the program.

08 Volunteer and shadow:

Finding opportunities to volunteer in healthcare settings or shadow PAs in various specialties are great ways to showcase your commitment to service as well as gain exposure to the profession.
